Did you hear your son or daughter talking about the PBL? It was the big topic at Crossroads in February.

Although the PBL was scheduled to be a 2 week unit, the snow made it take most of the month.

The students were allowed to choose a subject based around the overall topic of Indigenous Peoples. They were in charge of their own learning, asking the driving questions and doing all the research on the subject they chose. Students were able to earn a quarter credit in a subject area or elective.

Each student was to produce a product along with written material on the subject.

Students had 12 full school days to complete their projects, and it culminated in "Cultural Awareness Night" on February 26th.

After three and a half long weeks, with intermittent snow days, the students were able to show off their work ~ and what an incredible night it was!'

All family members and community members were invited.

Dinner tables were set and decorated by the members of the project management PBL. Students mixed up and cooked fry bread right in front of the guests.

Projects lined the halls and dotted the commons. Students stood ready to present to anyone who was passing by. You could tell how proud they were as they explained their projects and what they had learned.

Members of the Tulalip Tribe joined us that evening and brought dinner, including ham, macaroni salad, and beans. They also provided entertainment on ceremonial drums, and got many of the younger guests to participate with them.

A wonderful evening was had by both students and guests.



The project month culminated in a field trip to Hi-Bulb Cultural center on the Tulalip Reservation.

This was the first attempt at a Project Based Learning Unit at Crossroads. Based on student participation, and community involvement, we are hoping to continue to do a PBL at least once a year. ### Seattle Children's Theater comes to Crossroads

The play *Ghosted* will be performed by Seattle Children's Theater at an assembly in the Crossroads gym on March 26th.

Ghosted is a play about the often stigmatized topic of anxiety and depression. The playwright, Trista Baldwin, remembers how hard it was to talk openly about sad or anxious feelings in high school. She remembers questioning whether or not it was "normal" to have certain feelings or reactions to things.

She wrote *Ghosted* after listening to the Children's Theater teens talking on a

panel about their own anxiety and depression. She learned how the teens were feeling, and how adults could best help them.

When we find out about peers and depression we are often worried about losing them. We ask "what can I do? What should I do? What is enough? What is too much? And there are no clear answers.

Communication is the key. When we don't share difficult things with others, it can reinforce the stigma around them.

But when someone opens a door and admits to having a problem, it shines a light on everyone's problems, and suddenly we are not alone.

Ultimately, *Ghosted* is about breaking down barriers and talking about anxiety and depression. None of us is ever as alone as we think we are.

We are pleased to be able to work with Seattle Children's Theater to bring this subject into the light. Be sure to ask your student what they experienced after seeing *Ghosted* on March 26.
